

What is an iron-based flow battery?

Iron-based flow batteries designed for large-scale energy storage have been around since the 1980s, and some are now commercially available. What makes this battery different is that it stores energy in a unique liquid chemical formula that combines charged iron with a neutral-pH phosphate-based liquid electrolyte, or energy carrier.

Can iron-based aqueous flow batteries be used for grid energy storage?

A new iron-based aqueous flow battery shows promise for grid energy storage applications. A commonplace chemical used in water treatment facilities has been repurposed for large-scale energy storage in a new battery design by researchers at the Department of Energy's Pacific Northwest National Laboratory.

Are flow batteries a viable alternative to lithium-ion storage systems?

High-tech membranes, pumps and seals, variable frequency drives, and advanced software and control systems have brought greater efficiencies at lower expense, making flow batteries a feasible alternative to lithium-ion storage systems. Each flow battery includes four fuel stacks in which the energy generation from the ion exchange takes place.

How does a flow battery store energy?

The larger the electrolyte supply tank, the more energy the flow battery can store. The aqueous iron (Fe) redox flow battery here captures energy in the form of electrons ( $e^-$ ) from renewable energy sources and stores it by changing the charge of iron in the flowing liquid electrolyte.

Redox flow batteries can be divided into three main groups: (a) all liquid phases, for example, all vanadium electrolytes (electrochemical species are presented in the electrolyte (Roznyatovskaya et al. 2019); (b) all solid phases RFBs, for example, soluble lead acid flow battery (Wills et al. 2010), where energy is stored within the electrodes. When the battery is being discharged, the transfer of electrons shifts the substances into a more energetically favorable state as the stored energy is released. (The ball is set free and allowed to roll down the hill.) At the core of a flow battery are two large tanks that hold liquid electrolytes, one positive and the other negative.
