

# Total domestic battery energy storage

How much battery storage capacity does the United States have?

Battery storage capacity in the United States was negligible prior to 2020, when electricity storage capacity began growing rapidly. As of October 2022, 7.8 GW of utility-scale battery storage was operating in the United States; developers and power plant operators expect to be using 1.4 GW more battery capacity by the end of the year.

How much energy does a battery storage system use?

The average for the long-duration battery storage systems was 21.2 MWh, between three and five times more than the average energy capacity of short- and medium-duration battery storage systems. What is the average power capacity of a battery storage system?

For costs reported between 2013 and 2019, short-duration battery storage systems had an average power capacity of 12.4 MW, medium-duration systems had 6.4 MW, and long-duration battery storage systems had 4.7 MW. The average energy capacity for the short- and medium-duration battery storage systems were 4.7 MWh and 6.6 MWh, respectively.

What are base year costs for utility-scale battery energy storage systems?

Base year costs for utility-scale battery energy storage systems (BESS) are based on a bottom-up cost model using the data and methodology for utility-scale BESS in (Ramasamy et al., 2021). The bottom-up BESS model accounts for major components, including the LIB pack, inverter, and the balance of system (BOS) needed for the installation.

How many large-scale battery storage systems are there in the United States?

At the end of 2019, 163 large-scale battery storage systems were operating in the United States, a 28% increase from 2018.

When will large-scale battery energy storage systems come online?

Most large-scale battery energy storage systems we expect to come online in the United States over the next three years are to be built at power plants that also produce electricity from solar photovoltaics, a change in trend from recent years.
